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Lesson 1: Nouns and Verbs

Type of Lesson: Immersion

Time: 15 Minutes

WHAT'S HAPPENING?

Students will partner up and talk about either or both of the guiding questions:

- What do you notice about the types of nouns and verbs that are used?
- How are nouns and verbs connected in sentences?

YOU WILL NEED

- Long-term grammar partnerships
- Mentor text: "A Day at the Beach" (Handout 4.1)
- Grammar notebooks
- For the teacher's reference only: "A Day at the Beach" Mentor Text Reference Guide (see page 110). Use this to guide your prep and the class conversation.

LESSON STEPS

- Give each partnership one copy of the mentor text or project it for all to see. Read the mentor text aloud, while students follow along.
- 2. Share something you notice about nouns or verbs, such as, "Some nouns are capitalized, and others are not. Some verbs are action words, and others are not."
- Invite students to get curious about the sentences in the mentor text. Pose the guiding questions above. Ask students to jot down their thoughts in their grammar notebooks.
- 4. Visit around the room and listen to what students are saying.
- 5. Wrap up the lesson by sharing out some ideas that groups had.
 This may sound like, "Some groups noticed that nouns often begin

sentences and verbs come after nouns. Others noticed that some nouns end in 's' or 'es.' Some nouns are capitalized. Some verbs end in 'ed.'"

WHY THIS LESSON?

Nouns and verbs are foundational components of grammar, and being able to identify and use them appropriately helps students develop a strong foundation for more complex writing and Grammar Study.

TIPS

- If this is initial work with nouns and verbs, you might simply focus on singular and plural nouns and present/past tense verbs.
- You might also focus one reading of the text only on nouns and a second reading only on verbs.

Overview of Verbs

- **Regular Verbs:** boarded, checked, called, responded, cheered, waved, spread, played, made, caused, stared, followed, jumped, gathered, shared, whispered
- **Irregular Verbs:** are, was, were, had, been, sang, sat, flew, ran, made, led, came, held, found, went, began
- Future Tense: will come, will last
- Past Perfect Tense: had shared
- Modal Verbs: would last, can't wait
- **Passive Voice:** "The day was filled with laughter, sandcastles, and teamwork."
- **Linking Verbs:** "everyone was tired"

Frequently Confused Words

- To/Two/Too
 - o . . . the annual beach trip **to** Shadow Bay
 - David made funny faces and caused **two** other campers to erupt in laughter
 - Maria's face lit up as she nodded and replied, "Me too. This was the best beach trip ever!"

- There/Their/They're
 - o Emily, David, Michael, and Maria, are you all back **there**?
 - o The kids cheered and waved **their** beach towels over **their** heads
 - After dipping **their** toes in the water, they held hands and jumped in together!
 - o Another counselor responded, "Yes, **they're** right here!"
- It's/Its
 - o I can't believe **it's** over!
 - o By the time the sun began its descent . . .
